She describes her talk as "A presentation on my Quilting Journey with a focus on Pattern Design, Quilts as Art and Quilting through Cancer."



Lois Wheatley

I learned to hand piece and quilt in 1981 when I took a class at Fanshawe College with Ann LaRocque. I made about three quilts that were hand pieced and cut out using cardboard templates, but prefer using a sewing machine to piece. I did not quilt much during the 1990's but took it up again in the early 2000's. I enjoy quilting on my sit-down mid-arm quilting machine without stitch regulation. I've been a member of Oxford

Quilters' Guild since 2018 and am currently the President for this year.

Joan Ford

My name is Joan Ford and I am the Secretary for the Oxford

Quilters Guild. I attend and take notes at the monthly executive meetings. I then write them up and email them out to the Executive, usually about four days after the meeting. I also post the previous months minutes on the bulletin board in the Quilting Room. The monthly meetings are by zoom. There are ten meetings in the year as no meetings are scheduled in the summer.

I joined the Guild about 23 years ago after taking a beginner quilt class from Jean Hillis (one of the founding members of the Guild and still active in the Guild).

I have resided in Ingersoll for 38 years and have been an avid volunteer in numerous capacities: Heart and Stroke and Cancer Canvassing, Interchurch Relief, STICH, OPAL, Oxford County Social Justice, Trinity Church Board, The Ontario Health Coalition and a volunteer at Alexandra Hospital. As long as I am able, I enjoy giving back to the community that I reside in. And when I am not volunteering, I like to garden, attend theatre, read and do some travelling! Plus quilt! I feel so fortunate to have found the Art Centre and others who enjoy the same interests as I. It has all been a great experience!

Quillters' Studio Time is Mondays from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. and Thursdays 3:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.

Please:

If you get something out, put it away when finished.

Leave your work area clean and tidy before you leave, including sweeping up.

Empty, unplug and clean coffee pot and tea kettle if you use it.

Make sure any irons are off and unplugged.

Do not put water in irons, please use spray bottles with water only.

Clean iron if there is any residue on it from products you have used.

Make sure ceiling fans are turned off and any open windows closed.

Your help in keeping the studio a pleasant place to create in is greatly appreciated.

News from Other Guilds

The Stitch Market

Perhaps known locally as the "fabric sale", this has been a popular biennial event in St. Marys - thanks to the late Nancy Vermond. She spearheaded the idea to raise funds for Stonetown Grandmothers to support the Stephen Lewis Foundation and efforts to help grandmothers raising orphaned grandchildren due to Aids. This year the Rotary Club of St. Marys and the St. Marys Hospital Auxiliary have partnered to keep the event going. All proceeds will be divided between these two groups to support Rotary's African projects and the St. Marys Memorial Hospital.

We ask that people donate fabric, yarn, buttons, trim, elastic, lace, books and magazines, sewing tools - anything related to textiles. This is a good way to re-organize one's stash, clean out for people no longer wishing or able to continue their hobby or art or community minded folks who believe in supporting local and global efforts. The sale is perfect for those who believe in the importance of re-purposing and reducing the use of landfills.

There are several places and dates/times to donate. Volunteers will then sort and organize the donations into groups such as cotton fabric, other fabrics, sewing notions, various kinds of yarn, books and magazines, tools, etc. Sales are by donation with the sale being held on Friday, October 27th from 6-8 and Saturday, October 28th 10 am to 1 pm at St. Marys United Church.
