cooking oil, vinegars healthy snacks for school lunches

The Halton Quilters Guild Loonie Auction

Bring your loonies, toonies and more!
There will be over 30 gift baskets available to be won.

Here's how it works:

#1 If you like the basket being offered, hold up your hand. The MC will point at you and give you a number. You are responsible to jot down the number (paper provided) AND put a loonie in the cup in the centre of the table. Bid as often as you like by jotting down each number and puting a loonie in the cup for each number.

#2 When the bidding is closed, a number is drawn – if it is your number, you win the basket!!

#3 A runner will collect the loonies from your table and we start over again with the next basket!



2004/2005 (190 members)

Draws for a prize for members wearing a name tag at the monthly guild meeting were started. Unfortunately talking during the presentation had become a problem, so it was decided to place cards reminding people not to talk during the presentation on the tables!



In October our guild hosted the Regional Guild meeting - a very worthwhile networking session of Ontario guilds held twice a year in which guilds share ideas. (Do these still happen?)

The guild executive continued last year's discussion about capping the membership as a large guild brings lots of difficulties, how to service and meet the needs of everyone. They also discussed how the guild might make new members feel more welcome - start a buddy system, have greeters at the entrance, have a New Member Ambassador person or table*. (*We did have this for a time.)

Snippets Discussion continued about the printing and mailing costs to provide members with the newsletter. There was talk of sending Snippets by email but decided against as the worry was that it is bulky and may crash members' systems. Also, not everyone has email and some members do not like to read it on the screen. (How the world has changed!)

It was agreed that advertisers who pay in advance for a full year would receive a free month as thanks for their support. It was noted that, once the website is up and running, the newsletter will be available there. Members agreed to the proposal to purchase the "Publisher" computer programme as a way to improve the quality of the newsletter.

2005 Quilt Show - In late June 2004 a venue had finally been found - Park Bible School (Kerns Rd., Burlington), but it necessitated a change in the date from late April to the first weekend in May. (I'm sure there was a big sigh of relief all around!) Members made a pin cushion giveaway (made with the large juice bottle tops!) While the show was a success, It was agreed that the venue would not be suitable for the next quilt show. So plans were made to start looking for 2007!
